

AP Macroeconomics Summer Assignment

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This assignment is designed to introduce students to economic indicators and basic macroeconomic concepts and to help them recognize the value of studying macroeconomics.

All work must be prepared as your own original work in a single document and submitted to Turnitin.com no later than 11:59 PM on Monday, September 2, 2019. In addition to submitting the assignment to Turnitin.com by the due date, a printed copy of the completed assignment must be submitted to your instructor on your first day of class. Students are expected to complete the assignment properly and in its entirety if they wish to remain enrolled in the course.

Assignment Instructions:

This is a two-part assignment, however all work should be prepared in a single document. Be sure to clearly label Parts One and Two within your document for clarity.

Part One:

1. Review the list of Economic Indicators on the page that follows, and select ten (10) items from the list to research.
2. For each of the ten (10) Economic Indicators you have selected, define it **IN YOUR OWN WORDS**, and then describe its impact on your life now and how it might impact you in the future. Include the name of the Economic Indicator in **BOLD** within your definition and description.
3. You must properly credit all research sources. Include a Works Cited page at the end if you use parenthetical references/citations within your document, or include a Bibliography of sources if you use footnotes or endnotes format. Part Two:

1. Write an essay on the topic of why studying macroeconomics is important and how knowing this information can help you and the average person in his/her life.
2. Your essay should be in a standard five-paragraph format with an introduction, body, and conclusion and written using proper English grammar.
3. It is not expected that you know much about the subject of macroeconomics at this point, but hopefully you have a general idea of what the course is about and can use that, at a minimum, to formulate a valid response. You will revisit this essay later in the course after having explored the subject in more depth.
